

# **BOOK OF THE MONTH**

**MAY 2008** 



Drown (1996) is Junot Diaz' debut collection of ten semiautobiographical short stories. The tales are based in the 70s and 80s Dominican Republic and New Jersey. Drown like Down These Mean Streets speaks of young men growing around poverty, racial and cultural conflicts. This collection of stories also gives a glimpse into the Dominican life on the island. Diaz has compared this simultaneity of experiences, as a work of science fiction, where life in the Dominican Republic and the United States are two different realms, "jumping between two entire existences, two entire temporal moments, is what it feels like." The stories are interconnected like In Cuba I Was a German Shepherd, by its themes and the repetition of characters.

### **Author**

Junot Diaz, born in the Dominican Republic migrated at the young age of 6 with his family, to a poor working class neighborhood of New Jersey. His first name is Haitian and is pronounced as the Alaskan capital, Juno. He is a Creative Writing professor at MIT. Diaz has other short stories published in various magazines like the New Yorker and The Paris Review. *The Brief, Wondrous Life of Oscar Wao* (2007) is Junot Diaz' much awaited

second work and first novel. It was recently awarded the Pulitzer Prize for
