

**D**own These Mean Streets (1967)

is the autobiography of the author Piri Thomas, a dark skinned man of Puerto Rican and Cuban descent growing up in the poor neighborhood of "Spanish Harlem" or the *barrio* during the Depression years. As the title suggests, the author recounts his struggle to survive the harsh environment of street life, racism and poverty. This book is considered a classic among US-Latino literature, for its hardhitting style and content. The book even after 40 years, reads like a contemporary novel dealing with issues of young men, racism, poverty and identity. Down These Mean Streets has been compared to Malcom X's autobiography, for its obvious resemblance of tales of black men, surviving in spite of the wretched circumstances. Thomas is

working on another installment of his autobiography titled A Matter of Dignity.

## Author

Juan Pedro Tomás, better known as Piri Thomas, was born and grew up in the Spanish Harlem of New York city during the Depression years. He struggled with poverty, racism and gang wars and was incarcerated for armed robbery for seven years. Once released he turned his life around to inspire and work for young kids and help them survive through the problems of street life. *Savior, Savior, Hold my Hand* 

(1972), 7 Long Times (1974) are some of his other prose. Thomas is also a poet and true to his roots has recorded the
