# **BOOK OF THE MONTH**

JANUARY 2010



Caramelo (2002) is Sandra Cisneros second novel, written in her wellknown humorous style of story-telling vignettes. Celaya (Lala) Reyes, the seventh child and the only girl among her siblings, brings to life her multigenerational family, living from Mexico to Chicago. The 86 chapters and a "Pillón," (which is explained) leave you wanting for more, as many characters remain undeveloped, for there are so many. The narration is interspersed with Spanish words and phrases, without a glossary, which should not hinder your reading if you do not understand Spanish, but if you do, it brings the characters to life. Many of the chapters have endnotes helping you understand the cultural, and historical references or are anecdotal information about the characters. There is also a chronology of various Mexican historical and cultural events at the end of the book. The title refers to the Caramel color of the family heirloom, a wrap worn by women.

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## **Author**

Sandra Cisneros was born in 1954 in Chicago, where she went to Loyola for a degree in English and to the University of Iowa for her Masters in Creative Writing. She has used her talent of writing to help school dropouts in her hometown, and as a visiting artist in many universities. She has many poetry collections including My Wicked Wicked Ways and Loose Woomen. She is also known for her fiction The House on the Mango Street and Women Hollering Creek. She lives in San Antonio, Texas and was known for her controversial choice to paint

her house violet, which she later changed to bright pink. She has received many awards herself, and helps many other new artists through


