

Dreaming in Cuban (1992) is

Cristina García's first novel about the three generation of women of the del Pino family. Cecilia, the grandmother a devout Revolutionary patrols the beaches against surprise attacks by the United States and the "gusanos" leaving the country. One of her daughters Lourdes a staunch anti-Castro exiles to New York to achieve her American Dream with the Yankee-Doodle Bakery. Lourdes' daughter Pilar, born on the day of the Cuban Revolution, seeks her Cuban roots while embracing American culture and painting Punk Lady Liberty on her mother's bakery. García's tale remains impartial to the Revolution, while telling a story of a Cuban family. A part of the story is told through the love letters that Cecilia writes, but never sends, to her Spanish lover. She stops the day of the Cuban Revolution; also the day she turns 50 and her granddaughter Pilar is

 ${f B}$ orn on 4th of July 1958 in Havana, Cuba, Cristina García grew up in New York where her family exiled in 1961 after the Cuban Revolution of 1959. Her academic training is far from literature with a B.A. in Political Science and a M.A. in International Relations. She intended to work for the Foreign Services after graduation, but ended up in journalism after a three month stint in Marketing with Proctor and Gamble in West Germany. In the 1980s she worked for Boston Globe, Knoxville Journal and Time Magazine, and in 1990 she finally quit journalism to become a full time fiction writer.

Her other novels are *The Agüero* Sisters, Monkey Hunting and A Handbook to Luck. She also has an illustrated book of Vintage Cars in Cuba.
