
Language table

At the undergraduate level, FLL offers majors in French and Spanish. Students must complete a minimum of 36 hours, distributed in the following way: 6 hours at the 200 level, 24 hours at the 300 level, and a minimum of 6 hours at the 400 level. Highly trained specialists offer a wide spectrum of courses in:

FLL also offers minors in French. German, and Spanish. Students must complete a minimum of 18-21 hours at the 200 level or above. If you are interested in a less commonly taught language, you can take classes in Japanese, Latin, or Portuguese.

At the graduate level, FLL offers a Certificate in Hispanic Studies. Different from a traditional graduate program, this 18-hour program allows students to focus on professional and practical needs of their personal preferences.

Study Abroad

A student who majors in Spanish and Social Work will communicate effectively with the Hispanic clientele of a social agency. A dual major in French and Business will enable a student to interact with customers from one of North Carolina's major trading partners. Common dual majors consist of a foreign language and Psychology, English, Marine Biology, Social Work, Nursing, History, or Communications.
