responsibilities continue. For the past ten years, I have taught an innovative course to socialize entering freshman to the university. During the Spring of 1998, I served as UNCW's first Director of an Honors Semester Abroad Program. This program was at the University of Wales at Swansea. Today this foreign educational experience is a part of the university honor's curriculum. In 1994, I taught an honors section of American National Government; my students designed, utilized, and analyzed a survey instrument to evaluate public opinion. During Fall Break these students participated in a field learning experience in Washington and Philadelphia. During Fall 1995, with the Director of the University Honors Program, I team taught an Interdisciplinary Honors course in Political Sociology. In the Spring 1996, I developed and taught a "real time" distance learning, interactive, television class. In the Fall of 1992, I was an exchange faculty member at Kyung Hee University in Seoul, Korea. I served 1990-91 and 1989-90 as chairman of the University's Committee on Reappointment, Tenure, and Promotion. Currently I am on the manuscript review board of Southeastern Political Review and provide commentary to local and state media in the areas of my political expertise.
