COURSE DESCRIPTION

From the UNCW Catalogue: **EDN 455 - International Education Field Experience.**

Prerequisites: Admission to Watson School of Education, permission of instructor. This course is designed to provide experiences in a selected educational setting as part of a study abroad program.
3 credit hours

OVERVIEW

This International Field Experience (EDN 455) will provide 5 weeks of daily experiences in selected primary or secondary schools in San Pedro, Belize. Students will observe Belizean teachers in schools, provide instructional support, keep electronic journals of their experience, record and analyze similarities and differences of the Belizean educational system studied with their traditional internship experience, and develop curricula and support materials based upon this international experience. Students will also engage in a service project in Belize that is student focused and serves the needs of the school-based community. This international field experience will focus on the following: current field experience experiences in global education; the development, implementation, and assessment of curricular materials; and the evaluation and integration of relevant pedagogy and technology in the international classroom.

PURPOSE

The purpose of this course is to provide teacher candidates with: 1) active participation in a five week field experience in a Belize using an indigenous curriculum; 2) the opportunity to teach lessons during an international field experience, thereby giving students an opportunity to collaborate with Belizean teachers and provide instruction to Belizean children, merging US teaching methodologies with Belizean strategies; 3) and negotiating understanding of each participant’s conceptual framework with an international educational framework.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

1. Students will record and reflect on daily observational experiences in a selected school in an international setting.
2. Students will compare and contrast a Belizean school setting with their American internship setting using electronic journaling through reflective practice.
3. Present and defend a philosophy for teaching children at your assigned grade level.
4. Students will demonstrate acquired knowledge, skills, and dispositions while applying a variety of instructional strategies to a novel setting.
5. Students will provide observable evidence of mastery of the North Carolina Professional Teaching Standards.
6. Students will create a video documentary highlighting an educational, societal and/or cultural factor in Belize.

7. Students will engage in a service-orientated project and demonstrate evidence of having completed the effort.
8. Students will prepare a thoughtful and reflective analysis comparing and contrasting the teaching experience.

SUPERVISION

Instructor Availability: Supervisors “on site” for five weeks in San Pedro, Belize.

ASSESSMENT

1. Educational Identity and Philosophy (50pts)

A. Philosophy of Education paper (25pts).

- Submit your pre IFE ‘Phil of Ed’ prior to leaving Wilmington, NC
 - **Due Monday, March 16th by midnight**
- Submit your post IFE ‘Phil of Ed’ upon returning to Wilmington, NC
 - **Due Wednesday, May 6th by midnight**
- Each product should be 1-2 pages in length

B. Teacher Identity Paper (25pts)

- Submit your teacher identity paper
- Reflect on your **current** identity as an educator based upon the international field experience; include comments on what you learned in relationship to the time invested.

- Apply international opportunities to **past** internship teaching experiences and contexts in the United States: What have you learned? How have you changed? What will you remember?
- Prepare a thoughtful and reflective analysis on your overall experience and articulate what you can apply to your **future** teaching experiences.
- Product should be 3-5 pages in length.
 - **Due Wednesday, May 6th by midnight**

2. Field Experience and Practice (75pts)

A. Notebook (15pts)

- You will be expected to **observe, document, and reflect on 5 lessons** in Belize.
- Where possible, **teach 3 lessons** at a selected primary or secondary school.
 - Reflective comments on the positive and constructively critical aspects of each of the 5 lessons you observe and 3 lessons you teach. **These comments must be thoughtful and incorporate your past student teaching internship.** Your analysis should incorporate the new 21st Century Standards. (1 page per lesson taught)
- Extensive discussion will take place in a **bi-weekly recitation class** at a site to be determined.
- Please see WSE field experience student evaluation form to be provided.
 - **Due Wednesday, May 6th by midnight**

B. Blog (30pts)

- Using Google's BLOG space at <https://www.blogger.com/>, each student is to post and keep an electronic blog of your experiences in Belize
 - Post to the electronic blog bi-weekly (one post prior to leaving and one post upon return, 2 posts x 5 weeks = 12 posts overall)
 - This BLOG is intended to be viewed by the Watson College of Education faculty, your family, friends, peers, internship students and partnership teacher.
 - **Due Wednesday, May 6th by midnight**

C. Video Journal (30pts)

- Using FLIP cameras, video cameras, smart phones, tablets, etc..., students are required to plan, capture, edit and prepare a 10-minute video documentary that addresses one educational or societal issue in Belize.
- Students can work together in groups of 2 or 3 (Be aware: **one grade will apply** to the entire group).
- All topics choices must be cleared with your professors.
 - **Due Thursday, May 6th by noon**

3. Service Project (25pts)

- A. Students can either **engage in a group effort or act individually** to return something to San Pedro Town's schools and children
 - Examples can include (but are not limited to): Create and facilitate competitive academic events (i.e. Science Olympiad Science Fair, Math Counts), volunteer at the library, volunteer at the humane society, after-school tutoring programs,

volunteering in literacy projects, theatre productions, environmental literacy programs, meet and greets, Habitat for Humanity type of work, etc.

B. Students will submit a **log book and group report** based upon the following criteria:

- Prepare a **short description** of the service you've undertaken...this can be the same for students engaged in group projects.
 - The description should be **one page in length**
 - The service projects will be posted on the website for public consumption, so choose your words wisely!
- Each student should invest **20 hours into the project**
 - Document your time invested using an excel spreadsheet or a word document
 - Be sure to enter **time devoted to service and activity undertaken.**
 - **Due Wednesday, May 6th by midnight**
