Any work missed, **for what the instructor has deemed a valid excuse**, will usually be replaced by an average of other similar work. You will be allowed to drop at least two quizzes and some of the quizzes may be takehome and require MAPLE. **Any missed quiz will be one that you drop.**

There will be three or four MAPLE projects/labs assigned during the semester. You will be allowed to work in groups of two on these projects and there will be some class time available for you to complete them.
