Grading:

- 8-10 "written" exercises of various sizes
- 2-3 oral presentations of various lengths

Class participation will be graded on a 9 point must-system

- 0 points for absence

- 5 points for average preparation and some participation
- 9 points maximum for walking on water

A final project consisting of an oral thesis prospectus defense (or other similar presentation) presented to a general departmental audience is expected for all students, and counts as one of the oral presentations. This will probably occur during the last week of classes and final exam week.
