

1998 House: Democrats Gain 5 Seats Senate: Democrats Gain 0 Seats




Figure 1.2 The Presidential-Coattail Explanation of Midterm Seat Losses





Party Polarization 1879-2009 Distance Between the Parties First Dimension




91st Congress (1969-70):

Figure 3. House Member's Ideological Location by District Presidential Vote (108th Congress, 2003-2004)









National Party ID (REGISTERED & LIKELY VOTERS ONLY) Latest Poll: 02/13/2011




Do you approve or disapprove of the way Barack Obama is handling his job as president?



Unemployment vs. Presidential Disapproval


—— Presidential Disapproval —— National Unemployment Rate




Do you approve or disapprove of the way Congress is handling its job?

Congressional Job Approval Latest Poll: 02/14/2011




How do you rate the U.S. economy –




