Abramowitz & Fiorina also <u>agree</u> about the <u>nature</u> contemporary political elites:





Madison's Core Assumptions 1. Human nature a) Often flawed by self-interest, haste, passion, and short-sightedness b) True of even the "best and the brightest" in both the mass public and elites 2. The best public policy comes from: a) Bargaining and compromise between competing interests b) Rarely does one side have a monopoly on wisdom and virtue 3. Compromise will happen more easily and often if both elites and masses are pluralistic rather than polarized
