Course Catalog Description: MAT 335. Linear Algebra and Matrices (3)

Prerequisite: MAT 162. Systems of linear equations, vector spaces, algebra of matrices and linear transformations, determinants, eigenvalues and eigenvectors, applications.

1. Read, write, and speak accurately about mathematical ideas and use correct mathematical notation.
2. Read and write mathematical proofs.
3. Use computer technology to perform matrix computations, explore mathematical concepts, and verify work.
4. Perform matrix computations, solve linear systems of equations and determine the bases of related vector spaces, and eigenvalues and eigenvectors, and diagonalize matrices when applicable.
5. Apply the mathematics of linear algebra to models of real-world problems.
