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Relational Dialectics

Baxter and Montgomery analyzed tensions in romantic relationships and began cataloging contradictions Forces that strain relationships among close friends and family members Relational dialectics – dynamic knot of contradictions in personal relationships; unceasing interplay between contrary or opposing tendencies

The Tug-of-War-Dialectics of Close Relationships

Contradiction is a core concept of relational dialectics

- "Dynamic interplay between unified oppositions" (Baxter and Montgomery)
- Draw heavily on Bakhtin who saw dialectic tensions as the "deep structure" of human experience
 - Bakhtin saw dialectic tension as opportunity for dialogue

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The Tug-of-War-Dialectics of Close Relationships

Contradiction (continued)

- Baxter: communication exerts simultaneous pulls on both ends of a taut line – a relational rope under tension
- Dialectical tension is a natural product, or unavoidable result of our conversations
- Contradictions can be constructive

Figure 11-1: Typical Dialectical Tensions Experienced by Relational Partners

Internal Dialectic (within the relationship)	External Dialectic (between couple and community)
Connection – Autonomy	Inclusion – Seclusion
Certainty – Uncertainty	Conventionality – Uniqueness
Openness – Closedness	Revelation – Concealment

Critique: Meeting the Criteria for a Good Interpretive Theory

Dialogue as a Constitutive Process

- Dialogue communication that is constitutive, always in flux, capable of achieving aesthetic moments
- Constitutive dialogue communication that creates, sustains, and alters relationships and social worlds



Second Generation of Dialectics

Dialogue as an Aesthetic Moment

- Aesthetic moment fleeting sense of unity through a profound respect for disparate voices in dialogue
- It's easy manage a "friends with benefits" relationship if partners just understand the rules

Second Generation of Dialectics

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Dialogue as Dialectical Flux

- Dialectical flux unpredictable, unfinalizable, indeterminate nature of personal relationships
 - Spiraling inversion switching back and forth between two contrasting voices
 - Segmentation compartmentalizing tactic by which partners isolate differ aspects of their relationship
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
