- charta, -ae f piece of paper
- sella, -ae f chair
- ianua, -ae f door
- lūcerna, -ae f lamp

Second declension masculine

- nominative singular ends in -us or -er (dictionary form tells you which): stilus, puer
- nominative plural ends in -ī: stilī, puerī
- accusative singular ends in -um: stilum, puerum
- accusative plural ends in -os: stilos, pueros
- murus, -ī wall
- stilus, -ī m writing instrument
- vir, -ī m man
- puer, puerī m boy
- liber, librī m book

Second declension neuter

• nominative and accusative singular end in –um: tectum, solum

- nominative and accusative plural end in -a: tecta, sola
- tectum, -ī n roof, ceiling
- solum, -ī n floor

Third declension masculine and feminine

- nominative singular has irregular endings
- nominative plural ends in -ēs
- accusative singular ends in -em
- accusative plural also ends in -ēs
- canis, can-is m or f dog
- felēs, fel-is m or f cat
- arbor, arbor-is f tree
- avis, av-is f bird
- bubō, bubōn-is m owl
