You are responsible for all material presented in class. Use the textbook to clarify your understanding of this material and as a source of additional examples. However, exam questions on material covered in class will be based on your class notes, not on additional information on these topics from the textbook.

I have indicated below the sections in the textbook that were NOT covered in class and for which you are responsible. Focus on the key (bold) terms presented and the main points of each section. The questions on textbook material will focus on broad themes or findings and key terms rather than very specific details. If a section of the textbook is not listed below you are NOT responsible for it, even if the material was not discussed in class either.

No more than 20% of the exam questions will be based on material presented only in the textbook or the articles. The remaining 80% of the exam questions will be based on lecture material.
